## COLLEGE PROFILE

Khalsa College of Education, Ranjit Avenue, Amritsar was established in 2005 with an ancestry of the main Khalsa College (Est. in 1892), Amritsar. Re-accredited with 'A' Grade by NACC in year 2022, the sole aim of the institution is to hone the precious human resource - the teachers, for the welfare of the society and nation. Striving for this aim, the college started its journey with 100 B.Ed. entrants on a rambling campus of 15.7 acres, with the grant of recognition from Northern Regional Committee, Jaipur (NCTE). From the session 2007-08, the college started PGDCA (T.E.) with a capacity of 40 seats. In the year 2008, the college got approval to start M.Ed. with 25 seats and in 2010, the number of seats increased to 35. In the year 2015 by Northern Regional Committee, Jaipur (NCTE), the college has granted with additional unit of 100 B.Ed. seats and from the session 2015-16 the college started accommodating 200 B.Ed. students (Two Years Semester System) and 50 M.Ed. students (Two Years Semester System).

## OUR HOSTELS: A HOME AWAY FROM HOME

Among the most fascinating features of the college which makes it the first choice of parents and their wards alike, is its home like hostels. The college campus has two hostels one for boys and one for girls with the capacity of 40 seats each. The hostel provides everything to create an environment conductive to academic pursuits, physical comfort and well-being, security, care and warmth.

#### Hostel Rules:

Every boarder is required to observe some rules during his/ her stay in the hostel.

- 1. The accommodation in the Hostels is provided on "first come first served" basis.
- 2. While making allotment of seats in the hostels, preference is given to the students coming from far off places.
- 3. The right to admission to the hostels is reserved with the principal.
- 4. Use of intoxicants, smoking and drinking in the Hostels is strictly prohibited. Any boarder found drunk or drinking and smoking in the hostels will be immediately expelled from the hostel.
- 5. A resident student who leaves the lights and fan ON, during his/her absence from the room, will be fined Rs. 50/- per day.
- 6. Extra electric wiring/fittings of electric appliances are strictly prohibited in the rooms.
- 7. After the completion of the session, all boarders are required to vacate the rooms and hand over the keys of the rooms to the Hostel Superintendent/Warden.
- 8. A scholar will be allotted a room only after he/she has paid full hostel dues for the full session.
- 9. Every boarder is provided with a rack, a chair, a table, a hard bed and electric fan. He/ She shall be responsible for the safety of the furniture issued to him/her. Furniture is not to be removed from one room to another or outside the rooms in any case.
- 10. The removal of electric holders and switches from the rooms is prohibited. The defaulters will be fined Rs. 50/- apart from the cost of the item.
- 11. No outsider, Guest, even Father/Mother, real brother/sister or relative is allowed to stay in the Hostel.

- 12. The Roll call is taken by the Superintendent every night at 7.30 P.M. At the time of roll call, the boarders must be in their rooms and keep their doors open, otherwise they would be marked absent. They must not leave the hostel after Roll Call.
- 13. Normally a student is not allowed to go home before 15 days.
- 14. There will be one prefect in each Hostel. They will be appointed by the Principal on the recommendations of the Wardens/Committee.
- 15. The resident students must join the kitchen of the hostel in which they reside. Meals will be served during the fixed hours in the dining hall and not in the hostel rooms. Taking the eatables into the rooms is not allowed.
- 16. The dates for the payment of dues for various hostels will be fixed and notified by the Hostel Warden's/Committee in Consultation with the Principal from time to time.
- 17. No indiscipline will be tolerated and the guilty will be expelled from the Hostel immediately.
- 18. Dues once paid are not refundable or adjustable.
- 19. All the boarders will help in keeping the premises clean.
- 20. All the Sikh students will observe Sikh way of life.

### SOME GENERAL RULES: KEEPING THE THINGS PRECISE

#### LEAVE

- If you have an urgent work at home get leave from the college. Leave up to two days will be sanctioned by your tutor and for more than two days get your leave sanctioned from the Principal, but it should be recommended by the Tutor.
- The medical leave will be granted by the Principal. This leave application should be supported by a valid medical certificate, and recommended by the Tutor.

### LECTURES / HOUSE TESTS

Take care that you have attended 80 per cent lectures as per the University Norms in each subject, failing which your admission for the university examination will be withheld.

## LIBRARY

At the time of admission each student is issued a library cum identity card. Always keep this card in person. It can be checked at any time. It will also help you to get books issued from the library. In case this card is lost, duplicate card will be issued on payment of Rs.50.

➤ To keep the books in circulation and make them available to all students the withdrawal of books will be governed by the following rules.

- ➤ When you borrow the books from the library check them thoroughly, after you have got them issued in your name then it is your responsibility to return them in proper form. Don't underline the pages or disfigure them. Disfigured books will not be accepted by the Librarian and you will have to replace them.

#### **PRIZES**

Apart from best performance in sports, curricular activities, academic performance, skill in teaching, special Prizes are awarded to those students who maintain 100 per cent attendance in all papers or in a particular paper.

#### ROLL OF HONOUR

Students achieving first position in the university/college in B.Ed., M.Ed., B.Ed. M.Ed. Three Years Integrated, B.A- B.Ed. four years Integrated Course and PGDCA (T.E.) courses will receive a certificate of merit along with a gold medal as recognition of their academic excellence.

#### PARTICIPATION IN INTER COLLEGE COMPETITIONS

The students who show a real talent in cultural activities will get ample opportunities to compete with students of other colleges. However, the talent will be identified through tutorial and house competitions.

#### **FEES**

- > Fees will be charged as per norms.
- Fees will be deposited before the commencement of the classes in each Semester.
- ➤ Fee for Group Insurance (Rs. 150/-) will be charged at the time of admission. Help will be provided at the time of any mishap as per the norms of Insurance Policy.

#### FEE CONCESSION

Concession is available according to the norms of the Management to really deserving students admitted to B.Ed. /M.Ed. /B.Ed. M.Ed. Three Years Integrated/ B.A- B.Ed. four years Integrated Course and PGDCA. (T.E.) courses. The students will have to apply to the principal through their tutors for this concession. The criterion of granting this concession will be on the following basis: (i) on merit basis, (ii) fatherless/orphan/physically challenged, (iii) governing council members/employees' wards, (iv) sports-persons (International/ National/ State/ District/ University), (v) Co-curricular activities (NCC/ NSS) and (vi) Brother/Sister Concession.






